

Native Americans of the Southeast and the Trail of Tears - August 26 (10:00 - 4:00)

Native Americans of the Southeast and the Trail of Tears – Learn about Native Americans of 1800s Alabama – what tribes lived in our area, what their lifestyle was like, and when they were forced to move from their lands and why. Experience the Trail of Tears simulation to learn about the journey they were forced to endure as they relocated to the west. Celebrate their culture as you learn to write using Sequoyah's Cherokee alphabet and make a Native American craft. Trail of Tears simulation and informational introduction will be offered at 10:00, 12:30 and 2:30. Craft activities are available throughout the day.

Introduction to Geocaching and Letterboxing - August 1 (10, 12:30 & 2:30

Do you like to solve puzzles and riddles? Then come have fun learning about the Victorian scavenger hunt called letterboxing and the high-tech scavenger hunt using GPS technology called Geocaching. DOROTHY DAVIDSON ROSENWALD SCHOOLHOUSE

The education staff is eagerly anticipating the opening of the Dorothy Davidson Rosenwald Schoolhouse. The building will provide much needed office space and storage for our growing education staff and expanding education programs. Two of our new education programs will be fully or partially located in the new schoolhouse.

The new **4th Grade School Day Experience** will be housed in the schoolhouse. This exciting program, developed in conjunction with a team of educators from Huntsville City Schools,

Madison City Schools and Madison County Schools, allows students to experience a day in the life of a 1918 Alabama school. Fourth graders will be transformed into 1918 students as they are outfitted in era-appropriate clothes, repack their lunches in baskets and pails, say the Pledge of Allegiance and study reading, writing, and 'rithmetic. Students also get to experience writing with a nib pen and ink, doing their lessons on slates, weaving a basket (vocational training), and games of the time period during recess. Visiting teachers will receive additional before and after lesson plans to further their students' educational experience. Students (and their accompanying teachers and chaperones) who have participated in test runs of the program are very excited about this day-long learning experience.

The **Industrial Room** of the new schoolhouse will be used on weekends and evenings for adult Folklife workshops. Burritt on the Mountain is in the process of establishing the Burritt Folk School, and the new schoolhouse

is a vital part of this new venture. It provides a wonderful space for adult students to learn and practice traditional skills such as tinsmithing, basket weaving, chair caning and much more. We have offered several Folklife classes this past year and those offerings are expanding as new classroom spaces open up.
